


The Australasian Science Education Research Association Ltd (ASERA) welcomes the possibility of ICASE hosting its 2016 conference in the Australasian region.

The Melbourne Convention and Visitors Bureau have advised the Department of Immigration and Citizenship of its bid for the ICASE World Conference on Science and Technology (ICASE WorldSTE) 2016 and have asked the Department to provide information regarding visa requirements and facilitation.

Under Australia's universal visa system, all visitors to Australia must have a valid visa to travel to and enter Australia (other than New Zealand passport holders and Norfolk Island permanent residents, who will normally be issued a visa on arrival to Australia).

There are a number of visa options available to people wishing to visit Australia. The appropriate visa option will depend, among other things, on the person's purpose for visiting and the length of stay.

While every effort will be made to facilitate the entry of ICASE delegates, each applicant must satisfy all criteria for the grant of a visa as set out in Australian migration law. This requires, among other things, that applicants are genuine visitors and meet Australia's character and health requirements. Information on character and health requirements can be found on the Department's website at http://www.immi.gov.au/allforms/character-requirements.

The Department will assist ICASE and the Royal Melbourne Institute of Technology by providing information on visa requirements to ensure that delegates are aware of the correct application procedures and are able to apply well in advance of their expected travel. Please refer to the enclosed document on current visa options for business events for further information on the Department's visa requirements. Please note that visa options may be subject to change.

Should the bid be successful, event organisers should contact the Department by email on <u>iecn.nsw@immi.gov.au</u> at least one year prior to the event. Contacting the Department early will ensure that processing arrangements can be put in place and any potential difficulties are identified and addressed quickly.

PROPOSED DATES

It is proposed that ICASE World STE will be held in July 2016. Holding the event in July is in keeping with the Northern Hemisphere summer break, and fits well with the Australian semester timetable. The conference will not clash with any major events that take place in Melbourne.

Melbourne has a number of schools with advanced science education, along with the Botanic Gardens and Observatory, the Centre for Education and Research in Environmental Strategies (CERES); an Award winning Environmental Park, and a specialist popular museum gallery called ScienceWorks, all of which are worth travelling to Melbourne to see!

Melbourne is renowned for a strong culture of innovation through collaboration. Together, the city's medical research community, biotechnology companies and global pharmaceutical organisations have achieved significant breakthroughs.

These commercial and scientific collaborations are integral to strengthening the capabilities of Melbourne's life sciences researchers and enhance their capacity to carry out world-class life sciences research.

The city has made its mark on the medical and scientific world, by developing breakthrough products such as the following:

- The bionic ear (Cochlear implant) was invented at the University of Melbourne, and has provided hearing for thousands of people throughout the world.
- In 2010, researchers at Bionic Vision Australia and the University of Melbourne unveiled a world-first prototype Bionic eye.

MELBOURNE: UNDER THE MICROSCOPE

Melbourne is a world leader in science and medicine. The state boasts 263 biotechnology companies, 13 major medical research institutes and seven teaching hospitals, with a robust biotechnology sector that attracts eminent researchers from around the world.

It is host to a number of major international and local companies that have chosen Melbourne as a key hub for their drug development and manufacturing programs. Melbourne is home to six major life science companies with a market capitalisation greater than \$AUD200 million, including Australia's two largest listed pharmaceutical companies - CSL (one of the world's top five bio companies) and Sigma Pharmaceuticals. International pharmaceutical companies including Bayer, Bristol Myers Squibb, Pfizer, Sigma Pharmaceuticals and GlaxoSmithKline have a strong presence in Melbourne.

VICTORIA UNIVERSITY



Currently, Victoria University is the

major tertiary education provider to the West of Melbourne, Australia's fastest growing region. A dual sector University, Victoria University intends to continue to expand its transnational education, and to be an increasingly attractive provider to industries on which we focus. Victoria University aims to be a great university of the 21st century.

SCIENCE EDUCATION

Science Education at Victoria University occurs in four Colleges. The College of Education, the College of Engineering and Science, and the College of Health and Biomedicine have provided some indicative activities below. We anticipate that the new College of Sport and Exercise Science will also be making a contribution to the activities of the ICASE conference in 2016.

The Victoria University team contributing to the ICASE conference come from each of the above Colleges and the conference provides an opportunity to promote science education from a genuinely interdisciplinary and applied base.

The College of Education (ICASE Team: Professor Pat Drake, Dr Deb Lipson, Dr Efrat Eilam, Barbara Black)

All science education through the College occurs in partnership with schools, and aims to enhance the understanding of the school science curriculum and pedagogy through joint activities. Specific science education distinctive work occurs in:

Forensic Science: a complex mapping between science, quasimilitary practices, and law. Forensic practitioners are first and foremost scientists. However, they need to apply their scientific knowledge and expertise within a legal context. We bring together research and teaching in the use of forensic science contexts/ topics to promote interest and drive curiosity in the teaching and learning of various science and mathematics topics (primary and secondary education). We consider how education can reflect the nature of forensic science and acknowledge the complex integration of science, technology, police prescribed practice, and law.

Play, Videogames and the Creation of Culture: We examine the part media such as video-games plays in the creation of culture, examining the design, production and use of immersive and realistic games as training and pedagogical tools. This work brings together scientistic method to the creation of cultural artefacts, such as particular forms of video games such as the "military shooter".

Robotics: our focus in science education is to teach the big ideas in science through the medium of particular science themes, one of which is "Robotics in education". Although it is really comprised of two components –construction and programming, our team mainly focus on the construction aspect. Robotics offers an opportunity to teach and learn Physics through construction of structures. This addresses static themes related to strength, stability, centre of gravity, balance, and development of 3D spatial skills; and dynamics is facilitated through the learning of simple machines with a focus on the teaching and learning of fractions and ratios through gears. Students then explore their environment via the robot, developing an understanding of actuating and sensing, and the difference between senses and sensors. This often acts as an entrée into dealing with students with special learning needs on their science based classroom. **Sustainability/Environmental Education:** implementing sustainability education that is aligned with the Australian government's strategic plans for advancing sustainability education within the tertiary education, designed following investigation of worldwide reported experiences and accumulated knowledge regarding implementation of sustainability education within the higher education and teachers' training programs.

Indigenous Science: By 2016 we will be teaching all teacher education students science through indigenous studies.

The College of Engineering and Science (ICASE Team Professor Stephen Bigger)

The focus of the contribution of the College of Engineering and Science is on the provision of high quality technical learning materials to help in the development of science content knowledge. A research chemist with an interest in Chemistry Education, Professor Bigger generates original laboratory experiments aimed at teaching concepts in chemical kinetics and polymer science. He writes software packages that are self-contained simulated laboratory exercises complete with the background reading, simulator, and exercises to be conducted using the simulator, and guidance on results analysis, etc.

The College of Health and Biomedicine (ICASE Team Professor Greg Blatch)

The focus here is on inter-disciplinary research and interprofessional education, for example, key inter-disciplinary partnerships bring together the complementary expertise of experimental bench scientists from Victoria University (e.g. muscle science, exercise metabolism and chronic muscle disease) with clinicians from the University of Melbourne (e.g. bone metabolism and chronic bone disease) and Western Health (e.g. orthopaedic surgery). This inter-disciplinary research and knowledge exchange interface provides a unique opportunity to translate fundamental research on chronic diseases of muscle and bone into therapeutic solutions clinically relevant to patients in the Western region of Melbourne. This inter-disciplinary space is exemplified by research that focuses on "Clinical Exercise Science and Active Living".

The College encompasses a number of health and allied health disciplines with attractive teaching programs (e.g. Aged Care, Nursing and Midwifery, Paramedic Science, and Osteopathy), that are well placed to engage in inter-professional education. Victoria University was recently recognized by government for its capacity to be a national leader in the development of inter-professional education, and this is prioritized as a key educational driver in the health space.

Australia's Electronic Travel Authority (ETA) system is among the world's most advanced and streamlined visa authorisation systems, which allows entry for over 30 countries and enables delegates to spend up to three months in Australia. Recent innovative enhancements to ETA arrangements allow for a traveller to apply for visa information over the Internet. The cost is AUD\$20.

The ETA is a stored electronic authority for travel to Australia for the short-term visitor. It replaces the passport visa label or stamp in a passport and removes the need for application forms. ETA visas are issued within seconds of being requested through computer links between the Department of Immigration and Citizenship, travel agents, airlines and specialist service providers around the world, ensuring delegates know their visas are in order before leaving their home country.

International Event Co-ordinator Network (IECN)

The Australian Government, through the Department of Immigration is committed to making conferences in Australia problem-free. The Department of Immigration and Citizenship has set up the International Event Co-ordinator Network (IECN), which provides advice and support on visa issues, while also acting as a conduit for information between event organisers and the Australian diplomatic missions, who will then process visa applications for their guests. The IECN is a designated group of experienced immigration employees who provide visa information to event organisers and their delegates. The role involves:

- Alerting event organisers to Australia's immigration requirements and, where necessary, providing briefings on those visa requirements
- Collecting and passing information to overseas posts about upcoming events and prospective overseas visitors at the earliest possible time – enabling more informed and timely decisions by overseas posts
- Resolving any discrepancies in information provided by visa applicants
- Explaining the decision-making process to event organisers




DOMESTIC ROUTES/AIRLINES

MELBOURNE – PERFECT WALKING CITY

Melbourne is the perfect walking city, with the city centre set out in an easily navigable grid and with the Melbourne Convention and Exhibition Centre located within easy walking distance to hotels, restaurants, cafes, shopping and attractions. It is supported by an integrated, easy to use public transport system, serviced by a network of trams, trains and buses.

For delegates who want to use public transport, there are many easy and accessible options, including:

DISCOUNTED PUBLIC TRANSPORT FOR THE ICASE WORLD STE

Representing Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander performers from many diverse tribes, the Aboriginal dance show preserves and promotes Aboriginal culture through a range of traditional and contemporary performances.



Traditional Aboriginal Welcome

A Welcome to Country' ceremony is a traditional Aboriginal blessing, symbolising the traditional owners' consent to an event taking place on their land. It always occurs in the Opening Ceremony of the event, preferably as the first item. This would be most suitable for the Opening Ceremony of ICASE World STE.

The 'Welcome to Country' is conducted by a representative of local Indigenous custodians who welcome the delegates to their country. The form of the welcome is negotiated between the Indigenous people and the event organisers. For example, the 'Welcome to Country' may consist of a single speech, or it may include some kind of performance such as a song, dance or a didgeridoo solo.



THINGS TO DO

Fashion Capital

Melbourne is known as a well-dressed city, where shopping has been elevated to a new art form. Explore dazzling boutiques, street markets, department stores and malls.

Wander inner city lanes and historic arcades and discover boutiques and specialist stores, local designers and historic tearooms, and admire the architecture of these historic thoroughfares.

Melbourne Central boasts more than 300 stores and Direct Factory Outlets (DFO) at South Wharf offers bargain lovers savings at some 120 outlets.

Harbour Town at **Waterfront City** features two levels of unique laneway shopping with over 90 discount outlet stores, as well as specialty fashion, food, entertainment and leisure outlets.

South-east of the city centre, discover **Chadstone Shopping Centre**, which has recently opened its own glossy avenue of global brands including Chanel, Jimmy Choo, and Prada. The centre houses 530 shops, the largest in the Southern Hemisphere.

Melbourne also hosts a market every day of the week, from the famous historic **Queen Victoria Market** to small street markets that sell local produce. Try the **Esplanade Market** at St Kilda on Sundays or the **Arts Centre Market** for locally-made goods.

Food Capital

You won't go hungry in Melbourne. Melbourne serves up some 75 ethnic cuisines, with over 3,000 restaurants, cafés, bistros and bars in the city.

Crown Entertainment Complex has become recognised as a fine dining destination. **Neil Perry's Rockpool Bar & Grill** specialises in woodfire-grilled meat and seafood, and **Koko**, one of Melbourne's premier Japanese restaurants, features a sake bar, tatami and teppanyaki rooms, all overlooking the Yarra River and city skyline.

Iconic institutions included the award-winning **Donovan's**, houses in a refurbished bathing house on Port Phillip Bay. **Comme** occupies an important Melbourne culinary landmark – the former **Mietta's HQ**, and **Botanical** is a modern restaurant that overlooks the **Botanical Gardens**.

Melbourne also offers a culinary patchwork of great dining options for budget conscious travellers. Delegates can choose from a wide range of affordable restaurants by heading off to **Lygon Street**, Carlton, Melbourne's slice of Italy, for pizza and pasta restaurants, or go to **Victoria Street**, Richmond, known as Melbourne's Little Saigon, where they can enjoy authentic and cheap Vietnamese cuisine.

Great Destinations After Dark

Melbourne has turned being served a drink into an art form, with thousands of bars located in laneways, basements, rooftops, and stylish venues throughout the city.

Set out to explore Melbourne's laneways and discover one of the city's eclectic bars for a memorable evening.

Good food and music, quiz nights and friendly crowds can be found at pubs around the edges of the city. Year-round, Melbourne heads up to rooftop bars for drinks and city views.

Melbourne's dynamic local music scene is supported by appreciative audiences who line up every night of the week to see their favourite bands at city venues and pubs.

Melbourne has more live music venues than any other Australian city and Victorians are passionate about live music, with around 5.4 million attendees at Victorian venues in 2009/10.

Amazing Arts & Culture Scene

Discover **Museum Victoria** and the world we live in. Comprising of the **Immigration Museum**, **Scienceworks**, **Melbourne Museum** and the Royal Exhibition Building, it explores and explains our histories and the world of science and nature.

The Melbourne Museum is located in the beautiful Carlton gardens and is next to the Heritage Listed **Royal Exhibition Building**. Just a short tram ride from the city centre the Museum is full of many diverse and interesting exhibitions including Australian Indigenous culture and history, the environment, the human body, the ancient world, animals and the Museum even has the world-famous racehorse Phar Lap displayed. Just down from Flinders Street Station on St Kilda Road is the impressive **National Gallery of Victoria** (NGV) which showcases artwork from around the world and regularly has awe-inspiring exhibitions. The NGV also has a home in **Federation Square** which exhibits remarkable Australian art.

Located right on the Yarra River right in the heart of the city the iconic spiral that is the **Arts Centre** is the home of the performing arts in Victoria and has many live shows including musicals, ballets and orchestras each night!

There is always a performance underway in Melbourne. The **Melbourne Theatre Company**, circus performances, comedy and innovative dances are all on show in spectacular heritage listed theatres.

History

The **Old Melbourne Gaol** is located right in the city centre just behind RMIT University and here you can visit the cell of Australia's famous bushranger outlaw Ned Kelly!

When travelling towards Flinders Street Station on a Swanston Street tram if you look out the front window you will see a very impressive building which is the **Shrine of Remembrance**. The Shrine was built to honour the lives lost in World War One and draws many visitors during the year. At the Shrine you can pay respect to the men and women who served in this war and learn about their experiences. You can just jump a tram from Flinders Street to get there or enjoy a pleasant 10 minute walk along the **Royal Botanic Gardens** to get there!

Visitors to Melbourne can also experience the unique Aboriginal culture and history of south-east Australia at the Koorie Heritage Trust Cultural Centre then explore the Ian Potter Centre at Federation Square to see excellent examples of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander art.



For the third time, Melbourne was awarded the world's 'Ultimate Sports City' in 2010, ahead of Singapore, London, Berlin and Sydney (SportBusiness Group).

Adventure

For the thrill-seekers try your hand at the skydiving at the **Melbourne Skydiving Centre** where you can choose to skydive over some spectacular locations like the Yarra Valley and the Great Ocean Road.

Hot air ballooning over Melbourne City or the Yarra Valley is a great way to take in the city sights and relax up in the air rather than walk around to each individual site! Trips are run early morning as this is when the air and lighting is best to get the best views possible! The flight takes around one hour and often includes a delicious breakfast.

Swim with the Sharks - **Melbourne Aquarium** allows those brave enough to do diving in the shark tank! Only for the courageous, swimming face to face with the sharks will be a story to tell for sure! For those not that way inclined Melbourne Aquarium has daily shows of shark and stingray feedings, as well as penguin, turtle and other ocean life sessions. The best thing about the Aquarium is that once you buy a ticket you can enter and exit as many times as you want during that day so you can go back and forth to watch the shows! The Aquarium is a great tourist attraction and if you don't get the chance to see the beautiful Australian marine life in the wild then this is perfect!

The **Eureka Skydeck** is 88 floors up and provides the best 360 degree view of the city! You can also take a plunge and step onto the glass cube known as "**The Edge**" for an extra cost, not for light-hearted this experience will delight people of all ages!

World's Best Sports City

With a dedicated sporting precinct adjacent to Melbourne's city centre, and home to five of the six most significant annual sports events held in Australia, Melbourne was recognised as the world's "Ultimate Sports City" in 2010.

Melbourne loves its sport, from the Australian Open Tennis Championships in late January to the Boxing Day Test Cricket match in December. Enjoy Formula 1TM Grand Prix action, or horse racing at the Spring Racing Carnival. From March to September, fans don team colours and head to Etihad Stadium and the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG) to attend the Australia Rules Football matches.

Melbourne also has proven expertise in staging major events, such as the Melbourne 2006 Commonwealth Games. The success of the Commonwealth Games, which saw Melbourne's infrastructure and event venues at full capacity, attests to the city's know-how, and reputation for, holding large-scale, internationally-celebrated major events.

Relieve magic sporting moments at the National Sports Museum at the Melbourne Cricket Ground (MCG), home to thousands of items from Australia's rich sporting history, plus a cinema and interactive games.



SIGHTSEEING IS EASY AND AFFORDABLE IN MELBOURNE

Free City Tourist Shuttle Bus

The Melbourne City Tourist Shuttle Bus is a great way to see Melbourne's attractions. This popular service operates daily every 30 minutes during the day. The complete trip takes approximately 1.5 hours and includes an informative on-board commentary as you travel around Melbourne.

Hop on and off the bus at any of the 13 stops at key city destinations including the Docklands Precinct, Melbourne Museum and Carlton Gardens, Queen Victoria Market, Melbourne Aquarium, Immigration Museum, Southbank, The Shrine of Remembrance, Royal Botanic Gardens and Chinatown.

City Ambassadors

Melbourne Greeter Service and Tourist Information Booths

The Melbourne Greeter Service is a free two to four hour walking orientation of the city for visitors to Melbourne. TWO HOUR /HALF DAY TOURS

Walkin' Birrarung – Yarra River



This unique walk is presented by the Koorie Heritage Trust – a not-for-profit Aboriginal community organisation – and gives participants a sense of the ancestral lands of the Indigenous Kulin people. Walkin' Birrarung is a journey back through time, exploring the dramatic and irrevocable changes of both the people and the place. This sensory

experience evokes the memories of a vibrant, natural and cultural landscape. The tour begins at Enterprize Park, where delegates follow the river upstream, stopping to discover the significance of sites and landmarks of the Kulin people and the colonial settlement of Melbourne.

Chocolate and Historical Treats Afternoon Walk



History and chocolate blend together to provide visitors with a delicious taste of Melbourne. The afternoon begins at Haigh's Chocolates in the elegant Block Arcade, where delegates will enjoy tastings and an insight into the family history of the company. The next stop is Galleria, where Déva will stimulate the senses with exclusive Cocoa-Le-Art handmade

chocolates. At Hub Arcade, Chokolait will entice delegates and in Royal Arcade, the oldest trading arcade in Melbourne, chat to Koko Black's chocolatier and taste their handmade sensations. The tour finishes with afternoon tea at Laurent Boulangerie Patisserie for a rich, French cake creation.

On this tour, delegates can discover local designers and speciality retailers in locations such as the 1869 Royal Arcade. EXPLORE VICTORIA



MELBOURNE - A GATEWAY TO REGIONAL VICTORIA

For visitors wishing to escape the city, a drive for little more than an hour in almost any direction will bring a myriad of experiences. From spectacular coastline scenery to Australian wildlife sanctuaries, boutique wineries to relaxing day spas, alpine skiing to world-class golf courses, regional Victoria has it all.

Yarra Valley

On the city's eastern fringe, discover the charming Yarra Valley and Dandenong Ranges. The Yarra Valley is famous for its vineyards, rolling green hills and fresh produce, while the neighbouring Dandenong Ranges offer stunning mountain scenery, lush forests and secluded fern gullies. The best of these regions can be enjoyed on foot, by bicycle or soaring above in a hot air balloon.

Mornington Peninsula

To the south east, the stunning Mornington Peninsula introduces you to the makers of fine wines and the growers of the freshest produce imaginable. Indulge in thermal hot springs, play a round of golf on championship courses or just lay back on a golden sand beach and enjoy the tranquil surroundings.

Phillip Island

Slightly further east, on Phillip Island, share your evening with an army of Little Penguins as they parade onto the beach at dusk and spend your days encountering more unique indigenous marine and land mammals in their natural habitat.

Great Ocean Road

FULL DAY TOURS

Daylesford – Pure Indulgence



Daylesford is the regional capital of indulgence, with spa retreats and natural springs, luxury accommodation, great cafés, local galleries and fine dining.

Delegates enjoy a scenic drive from Melbourne to the quaint township of Hepburn Springs, a former gold town established in the mid 1800s. An oasis of tranquility awaits at the Lavandula Swiss-Italian farm.

Visitors can take a walk around the stone farmhouse buildings, surrounded by a stunning garden, lavender fields, a small creek and distant hills, followed by a fine morning tea. They can then explore Daylesford's charming Convent Gallery, which has a fascinating history and wonderful local art. For some pre-lunch pampering, delegates can indulge at Hepburn Bathhouse – a 'must-do' when visiting Australia's premier spa destination, or visit local vineyards. The tour finishes with a leisurely lunch of the region's best produce at the award-winning Lake House.

The Bendigo Experience




This area of Victoria, which is easily accessible from Melbourne, is renowned for its stunning galleries, grand streetscapes, boutique stores and culinary delights.

The Bendigo Experience Pass incorporates the best attractions of the city. This includes the museum at Australia's oldest working pottery, Bendigo Pottery, established in 1858. Delegates can walk in the footsteps

of 19th Century miners in the Central Deborah Gold Mine – Mine Experience Tour, 61 metres underground. They can also experience a living history of the Chinese people of Bendigo from the Gold Rush to the present at the Golden Dragon Museum. The Bendigo Experience concludes with a tour of the city's historic streets, featuring sandstone buildings, remarkable architecture and century-old gardens on the Vintage 'Talking' Tram Tour.

Sovereign Hill



Re-live Australia's Gold Rush days on a full day tour to Sovereign Hill. A luxury coach transfer will take delegates to Ballarat for a tour of the town, which is an authentic re-creation of a 19th century mining town. Ballarat captured the world's attention in 1851 with the richest alluvial gold deposits in history. Today, Sovereign Hill recreates that golden era of excitement and

everyday pioneer life. Delegates can see costumed townspeople going about their business; be enthralled by blacksmiths and traditional craftsmen at work; visit the Gold Museum; ride on a stagecoach; and above all, try their luck by panning for real gold.

Learn to Surf



Catering for the beginner to the experienced, surf lessons have been known to unleash new talent and spark a desire to surf that will last a lifetime. Certified instructors will take delegates to a safe beach in Torquay, in the Bellarine Peninsula – Australia's home of surfing – and have them standing on the board in no time. Afterwards, the tour heads to the Surf World Museum, as well as

visiting famous Bells Beach.

Chef-led Journey through the Mornington Peninsula



The Mornington Peninsula is a popular destination for golf, food and wine and home to rolling hills of orchids, olive groves, historic mansions and vineyards.

Delegates will meet a local chef for a private, culinary expedition, through the Peninsula. Each journey changes seasonally, but groups can meet cheese-makers, learn about olive oil production, pick berries,

collect fresh seafood, go behind the scenes at a bakery, collect tomatoes or learn about chocolate making. Groups then arrive at a private kitchen with the produce they have collected and prepare for an afternoon of fun with an intimate, hands-on cooking class. A private tasting of local cool climate wines is also included.

Great Ocean Road



In this V.I.P. experience, delegates enjoy a bird's eye view of arguably the world's most spectacular coastline. An executive car transfer will take delegates from their hotel in Melbourne to Moorabbin Airport where they will take flight to the Great Ocean Road, which continues on for 243 kilometres. Along the way, the tour takes in the famous Twelve Apostles, the dramatic limestone

stacks that reach up to 45-metres in height. It also features stunning landscape of gorges and spectacularly shaped cliffs, including Loch Ard Gorge and the Blowhole.

The tour arrives at Warrnambool for lunch at Pippies by the Bay – a seafood odyssey with outstanding local wines. If delegates are lucky, they may even spot a Southern Right whale, which can be seen between May and October.



Pure Golf



Capture golfing indulgence to a 'tee' with a private helicopter transfer to some of Australia's premier golf courses, including 'The Dunes', Sanctuary Lakes and Sandhurst. 
Penguin Skybox, Phillip Island

Yarra Valley Wineries

The tour then passes through the township of Healesville, before visiting Rochford Yarra Valley for more spectacular wine tasting. The day includes a tour of Domaine Chandon, Moët & Chandon's Australian winery, where delegates can enjoy a glass of sparkling, accompanied by a delicious savoury platter, as they take in the panoramic views of the Yarra Valley.



Dandenongs by Train



Victoria's Puffing Billy is a centuryold steam train still running on its original mountain track from Belgrave to Gembrook in the scenic Dandenong Ranges.
